

Frequently Asked Questions

Barton	EBLI
Both are explicit, multisensory instruction that include segmenting, blending, and phonemic awareness.	
Print to Speech (Structured Literacy)	Speech to Print (Linguistic Phonics)
Letters first: Match letters to the sounds	Sounds first: Match sounds to the letters

Takes minimum 2x weekly tutoring for 2-4 years	Takes minimum 1x weekly tutoring for 5-8 months

Q: Does Barton teach spelling more than EBLI?

A: Both Barton and EBLI explicitly teach reading and spelling. However, as students naturally learn to read and spell, reading will progress faster than spelling will. EBLI

allows the students to progress their reading to their highest potential and lets spelling grow naturally with it. Barton requires students to bring their spelling and reading levels up to the same standard before they can progress to the next concept.

Q: Will tutoring cure dyslexia?

A: No. Dyslexia is not a disease to be cured. Dyslexia is a neurological difference that creates difficulties in learning to read. Students with dyslexia need to be taught in ways that make sense for their brains. With appropriate teaching, students can overcome the challenges in reading and spelling caused by dyslexia.

Q: Should my child have a 504 or IEP?

A: An IEP provides services to students within the special education system. The IEP sets learning goals and describes the services the school will provide. A 504 provides services and changes to the learning environment to enable students to learn alongside their peers. Both can be beneficial to students with dyslexia depending on their needs. Q: Should my child be held back a grade in school?

A: No. A growing body of research suggests that retention negatively impacts students and does not improve academic performance. Students need structured evidence-based interventions. Repeating the same curriculum in school is not effective. Retention can also lead to behavioral and socio-emotional adjustment problems.

Q: Are audiobooks beneficial for my child?

A: Yes! Audiobooks will help build your child's vocabulary when listening to books at or slightly above their grade level. Listening to textbooks is also beneficial for students of all ages to prevent reading fatigue. These websites offer audiobooks:
